Cities essential for success of Social Investment Package



At our social affairs forum in Barcelona on 5-7 March 2014, politicians stressed the fundamental role cities play in developing and implementing social policy.

The forum, on 'Building inclusive cities within the Social Investment Package', looked at the Commission's Social Investment Package (SIP) as a roadmap for social policy through to 2020.

Speaking at the evening reception, Xavier Trias, mayor of Barcelona, said: "Cities and local government must work together to demand a more active role in shaping and delivering EU social policy."

Delegates confirmed a desire to participate more in the formulation, management, delivery and evaluation of the SIP and to establish a direct link between European cities and the European Commission to better deliver priorities at local level.

The politicians also cautioned that the SIP's success will depend largely on European cities' involvement.

Henk Kool, chair of our social affairs forum and deputy mayor of The Hague, pointed out that cities "are the first to help address social problems".

Xavier Trias described the forum as "a great opportunity to share knowledge and experiences, enable mutual learning and exchange good practice".

HIGHLIGHTS

Highlights from our EU urban agenda seminar

EUROCITIES president, Hanna Gronkiewicz-Waltz, mayor of Warsaw, presented our initial position on an EU urban agenda at a side event we co-organised with the CEMR during the European Commission's urban forum on 17-18 February 2014. Our seminar was an opportunity to provide the local perspective on what an EU urban agenda should include, and how it could be implemented.

Our president said an urban agenda at EU level must be based on a practical, coherent and coordinated approach which allows cities, the EU, and national governments to work more closely together.

She suggested appointing an urban coordinator to support the European commissioner for regional and urban policy in joining up EU policies with an urban dimension. Existing methods for involving cities in EU policy developments should be reviewed to see how they can be developed further. Commissioners should make urban study visits and meetings with city mayors a standard part of their programmes when they visit member states. And the urban forum should set a precedent for biennial urban summits between the EU, national and city governments.

Speaking at the event, Johannes Hahn, commissioner for regional and urban policy, said it was the right time to discuss this issue, with EU parliamentary elections and a new European Commission just around the corner.

At an afternoon press conference, the commissioner said that DG REGIO would start preparing an action plan for an EU urban agenda.

Participants agreed that an increasingly urbanised Europe needs different levels of government to work together more closely and directly. Many participants also agreed that there is a lack of accurate data at urban level, making it difficult for policy makers to understand the performance and needs of urban areas. One recommendation was for the Commission to identify new indicators - other than GDP - to more accurately measure quality of life at urban level.

Speakers at the event included Daniël Termont, mayor of Ghent; Carla Rey, deputy mayor of Venice; Michal Olszewski, deputy



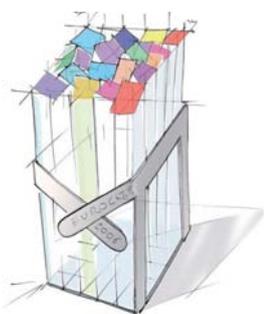
mayor of Warsaw; and Hella Dunger-Löper, Berlin's state secretary for European affairs.

Our taskforce 2014 will continue to develop our position on an EU urban agenda following the discussions at the urban forum.

The taskforce meets in Brussels on 31 March to discuss both the EU urban agenda and the European elections. Contact Soraya Zanardo if you would like to participate in the meeting.

155 cities apply for Mayors Challenge



realise its idea, while a further four winners will receive €1 million each.

The 155 applicant cities come from 28 countries and represent more than 71 million European citizens.

Of the 155 cities, nearly half are EUROCIITIES members.

Responses to the second edition of the Bloomberg Philanthropies Mayors Challenge have exceeded the inaugural US edition, with 26% of eligible European cities applying compared to 24% in the US.

The competition is open to cities with over 100,000 inhabitants. It rewards the most innovative ideas for solving pressing urban challenges, from unemployment to improving government efficiency to better engaging with citizens. A total of €9 million in prize money is available: the grand prize winning city receives €5 million to help

Some 70% of the applicants have generated ideas to address major social or economic challenges, including energy efficiency, obesity and ageing. The remaining 30% focus on improving the overall effectiveness and efficiency of local government.

Michael Bloomberg, former mayor of New York City, said: "These dynamic city leaders are working to find new ways to tackle some of our most pressing and common urban challenges – from youth unemployment to obesity to civic participation".

An independent panel comprising experts in innovation and urban policy is currently helping Bloomberg Philanthropies select the 20 finalists, to be announced in the spring. These will be invited to attend the Bloomberg Ideas Camp in Brussels on 29-30 April 2014 to refine and strengthen their ideas together with top policy, programme and innovation experts. They will then submit a final application by mid-summer, with the five winners to be announced in the autumn.

Public Consultation on the ESPON 2020 Programme



ESPON is the European Observation Network, Territorial Development and Cohesion. It is co-financed by the European Regional Development Fund (ERDF) and member states, and has a budget of €50 million for 2014-2020.

ESPON aims to provide evidence of territorial developments in the EU to inform policy making, notably regional policy. In this context, ESPON has financed some relevant studies for cities, including the research report on 'Second tier cities and territorial development' in 2012.

ESPON will continue these activities in the new funding period and has launched a public consultation on the priorities, shape and implementation of the new programme. The consultation is based on a draft cooperation programme. The consultation is open until 2 April 2014. More information is available at the link below.

Midterm assessment of Europe 2020

The European Commission recently published its paper 'Taking stock of the Europe 2020 strategy'. This followed the completion of year-long research by the Committee of the Regions (CoR) as part of a mid-term assessment of the strategy.

While the Commission paper does not draw conclusions or make recommendations, it identifies trends and rather mixed progress towards meeting the headline targets.

It specifies that: "The EU is on course to meet or to come close to its education, climate and energy targets. But given the magnitude of the crisis, we are not on track to meet our employment, research and development or poverty reduction goals, although results and forecasts vary widely across member states."

The CoR Europe 2020 platform has surveyed local and regional authorities on their progress towards each of the Europe 2020 flagship initiatives.

It also organised a series of events to discuss the findings and identify best practices to highlight progress or shortcomings.

The results of the research were published in February 2014 and add interesting findings to the Commission's paper, some of which are outlined below.

- Some local and regional authorities have included the Europe 2020 targets in their local development plans, which has allowed them to set priorities and achieve measurable results. Others have taken a less focused approach, mainly due to financial difficulties and lack of staff to deal with the strategy at local level.



- Progress towards the Europe 2020 targets is below expectations: gaps are widening between different European cities and regions in terms of GDP and employment, which reverses the convergence trend observed in the years preceding the global financial crisis. This is identified as a consequence of the major budget cuts undergone by cities and regions.
- For the CoR, the weakness of the strategy is that it ignores the strengths, weaknesses and specific development opportunities of Europe's territories. In other words, it is territorially blind.
- The CoR proposes that targets should vary between regions and cities, and that they should be set in partnership with all levels of government.
- Concerning the European semester, it has been observed that from 2011 to 2014, efforts have focused on short term needs for fiscal consolidation rather than on the long term objectives of the strategy.

The Commission will launch a public consultation to gather proposals on how to develop the Europe 2020 strategy over the next five years. This consultation should open this spring and conclude in the autumn.

6th European Summit of Regions and Cities



The Committee of the Regions held its 6th European Summit of Regions and Cities in Athens on 7-8 March 2014. The first day of the conference focused on securing a job-rich recovery, while the second was on the issues surrounding the forthcoming European elections. In the Greek context

especially, these themes are inextricably linked. Speakers, including Greek deputy prime minister Evangelos Venizelos, said they regretted the way the economic crisis and high unemployment rates have undermined citizens' trust in their elected representatives and, even more so, in their European representatives.

Antonio Costa, mayor of Lisbon, pointed out that better use of the Europe 2020 strategy to identify common targets for local development could help improve and measure progress on issues such as youth unemployment. He stressed that local authorities are best placed

to identify issues of unemployment and exclusion within their constituencies. They can also act directly on these issues, and in an integrated manner.

This point was echoed in President Barroso's keynote speech. The European Commission president urged cities and regions to make the most of a new economic cycle and use the new structural funds to invest in their territories and boost local economies. He said: "I support a stronger role of regions in planning and implementing structural funds...Regions and cities are best placed to know what the real needs of citizens are."

We displayed our 'Cities supporting inclusive entrepreneurship' and 'Cities tackling youth unemployment' publications at the event to showcase concrete examples of European cities' efforts to tackle unemployment.

European Lab Forum: European culture refresh!

Lyon | 27-30 May 2014

European Lab Forum is an international professional forum that aims to connect people in the fields of culture, politics, economics and the media, who are working to reform entrepreneurial models and cultural policies in Europe.

The forum was launched in Lyon in 2011 by Arty Farty, a non-profit organisation that promotes independent and innovative cultural practices, and is supported by EURO CITIES member Lyon and the EU. European Lab Forum runs in parallel with Nuits Sonores, an electronic music and digital culture festival attracting some 100,000 visitors to Lyon each year.

European Lab 2014 will focus on 'Revisiting cultural policies: a new leading generation for Europe'. We are a partner, together with Culture Action Europe and UGLG – Agenda 21 for culture.

There will be a complete programme of discussions and networking activities for vice mayors in charge of culture and for city culture directors. For example:

- in a private working session, participants will discuss current local strategies for culture, as well as new challenges for the coming years

- a specific panel open to all forum participants will focus on 'Reinventing local cultural policies: European vice mayors in charge of culture meet today's cultural professionals', during which vice mayors will exchange views with young European professionals on innovative and dynamic approaches in the field of culture

Networking sessions and a visit to Lyon's Confluence district, a unique urban renewal project, are also on the agenda.

EU funding opportunities for the cultural and creative sector

The EU has a specific programme, Creative Europe, to support the arts and cultural and creative industries.

However, there are also various funding opportunities for operators with a cultural project involving different sectors.

Other funding programmes and instruments under the multiannual financial framework 2014-2020 that can be used include Horizon 2020, COSME or Erasmus+.

The Erasmus+ programme can co-finance cultural projects with strong links to education, training and competence building.

The COSME programme aims to strengthen the competitiveness and sustainability of EU enterprises and SMEs and to encourage an entrepreneurial culture; it can be used by creative companies or those working in tourism, for example.

With the support of these funds, cities can make a decisive contribution to supporting the further development of the cultural and creative sectors and to strengthening their contribution to the Europe 2020 strategy for jobs and growth.

Launching Europe's first public lighting PCP



The five ENIGMA cities (Eindhoven, Espoo, Malmo, Stavanger and Bassano) have already researched the state of public lighting in European cities and the capabilities of new lighting technologies. They are now preparing to launch an innovative pre-commercial procurement procedure.

The first step is to communicate their intentions to the lighting industry and engage in an open, constructive exchange with businesses on the public lighting systems that need to be developed. As a result of these discussions, they can adapt

their ambitions and launch a call to the market.

To avoid any legal and intellectual property pitfalls that may arise when using this type of procurement, the ENIGMA project is training municipalities in PCP law on 28 March 2014 in Brussels.

2014 European Enterprise Promotion Awards



The European Commission has launched the 2014 edition of the European Enterprise Promotion Awards.

These awards are designed to recognise initiatives promoting entrepreneurship and small businesses; and to share best practice on entrepreneurship policies at various governance levels.

The six categories are:

- promoting entrepreneurial spirit
- investing in skills
- improving the business environment
- supporting the internationalisation of businesses
- supporting the development of green markets and resource efficiency
- responsible and inclusive entrepreneurship.

Interested organisations must first compete at national level. By May, two finalists from each country will have been selected. A European jury will then draw up a shortlist at European level. The shortlisted applicants and all of the national finalists will be invited to the awards ceremony, which will take place during the 2014 SME Assembly in Naples on 1-3 October 2014.

2030 energy and climate framework

Environment and energy ministers discussed the European Commission's communication for a 2030 framework for climate and energy policies on 3-4 March 2014 in Brussels.

Ministers had differing views about the targets proposed for 2030. Some agreed with the Commission, or even called for stronger commitments, while others found the proposal to be too ambitious. Some member states are concerned about hindering EU competitiveness with overly ambitious targets when there is no international climate agreement. Many insisted that EU member states should share the effort of emissions reductions fairly, and that each member state's specific situation should be considered in the new framework.

The Commission presented its communication on 22 January 2014, and the European Parliament adopted its corresponding resolution on 5 February.

Both institutions suggest a 40% reduction in greenhouse gases by 2030, compared to 1990 levels.

The Parliament wants to see more ambitious goals for renewable energy and energy efficiency. While the Commission proposes a 27% share of renewables in the EU energy mix for the 28 member states as a whole, MEPs call for a more constraining 30% target, with individual binding targets for each member state.

The Parliament also wants Europe to save 40% of energy compared to 2005 levels, whereas the Commission is no longer proposing an energy efficiency target.

Heads of state and government will discuss the 2030 targets at the European Council on 21-22 March 2014.

CASCADE learning and networking programme



More than 200 experts and decision makers from 39 European cities participated in CASCADE's one-year European peer-to-peer learning and networking programme. The programme ran from February 2013 to February 2014. It included 22 peer-to-peer learning and networking activities across the three CASCADE thematic areas: energy efficient buildings and districts; urban transport; and renewable energy generation and distribution. The 19 CASCADE partner cities worked with a further 20 cities, mainly in central and eastern Europe,

for this programme: Bacau, Belfast, Bilbao, Brighton & Hove, Bratislava, Budapest, Bydgoszcz, Gdynia, Hamburg, Iasi, London Borough of Haringey, Skopje, Sliven, Rzeszow, Tallinn, Tartu, Timisoara, Tirana, Vilnius and Yerevan.

In total, there were 11 study visits, five work shadowing visits and six mentoring visits. The programme allowed city experts and decision makers to share experiences and make contact with people working on similar issues and facing similar challenges. This helped improve existing policies and projects and inspire new ones.

CASCADE peer advice visits

CASCADE cities are demonstrating their leadership in energy practices through peer advice visits to neighbouring cities. The visit programme, launched in November 2013, allows CASCADE cities and their neighbours to share experiences and good practices on local energy leadership. The process involves a CASCADE city visiting two neighbouring cities to give advice and support on climate change and sustainable energy projects and initiatives.

More than 36 cities in the CASCADE partner cities' countries will receive support through the peer advice visits.

Green energy in Budapest

EUROCITIES member Budapest features in the latest video produced by the Covenant of Mayors office.

In Budapest, there is great potential to use geothermal energy. With the support of the city authorities, an innovative partnership was established in 2011 between the Budapest zoo, the historical Szechenyi thermal bath, and the local district heating company. This partnership allows heat from the thermal waters to be recycled in order to supply warm air to 350 species of animals and 500 types of plants in the zoo. This pioneering venture has already brought benefits: heat demand is covered by a cheaper and safer energy source, reducing energy costs by a third and avoiding some 500 tonnes of CO₂.

The results of this partnership are contributing Budapest's efforts to reach its Covenant of Mayors targets of reducing 21% of CO₂ emissions by 2020.

More accessible public sector websites

The European Parliament adopted its report on the Commission's proposal for a directive on web accessibility on 26 February 2014. The directive aims to ensure accessibility to the resources available on public sector websites to all users, including disabled people.

The Commission initially proposed to facilitate access for disabled people to 12 categories of public websites (including social security, personal documents or higher education).

MEPs went further, voting for a text that removes the reference to these categories, and instead applying the directive to all public sector websites. The Parliament also wants the new rules to apply to websites run by private entities performing public tasks, such

as those providing gas, heat, electricity, water, transport, childcare and health services.

Until the EU draws up technical web accessibility standards of its own, the level of accessibility required by the proposed directive would be level AA of the international technical standard WCAG 2.0.

It now remains to be seen if the Council of Ministers accepts, rejects or attempts to further amend the recommendations. EU officials believe agreement between the bodies to be likely, but the negotiation process will be delayed by this year's European Parliamentary elections.

Fresh discussions between the institutions will probably restart this autumn and final



agreement is unlikely to take place before early 2015.

Glasgow signs Green Digital Charter



Glasgow has joined 41 major cities from 17 countries in signing our Green Digital Charter.

Supported by our Networking Intelligent Cities for Energy Efficiency (NiCE) project and the European Commission, the charter focuses on using and sharing information and communications technology (ICT) to help create sustainable low carbon societies.

Glasgow's signature supports the council's sustainability agenda already being pursued through Sustainable Glasgow and Future Cities.

By signing the charter, Glasgow commits to using digital technologies to reduce the city's overall carbon footprint, while at the same time reducing the carbon footprint of ICT in the city.

Political agreement on reducing cost of broadband rollout

The European Council reached political agreement on the Commission proposals for a directive to reduce the cost of broadband rollout on 28 February 2014. The directive aims to ensure a minimum degree of coordination between network operators (telecoms, sanitation, energy and rail transport) in order to reduce the cost of civil engineering, and therefore the cost of deploying broadband in Europe.

According to the Commission, such coordination could save between 20% and 30% in engineering costs.

We submitted amendments last October relating to the protection of existing broadband models and city infrastructure, which were all approved by the European Parliament. The main differences to the original Commission proposals include a change of instrument from regulation to directive, and more protection of access to infrastructure.

Policy debate on e-learning

The European Civil Society Platform on Lifelong Learning (EUCIS-LLL) organised a policy debate on 'Digital wave: supporting a cultural shift in learning systems?' in Brussels on 4 March 2014. The event was chaired jointly by David Lopez (EUCIS-LLL), Maria do Céu Patrão Neves and Maria Da Graça Carvalho (Portuguese MEPs, EPP) and brought together representatives from civil society, lobbies and consultancies.

In their joint introduction, the chairs insisted that the EU must surf the digital wave and support the development of e-learning systems through relevant means. Debate then revolved around the ability of the EU to foster and guide the development of e-learning systems, notably massive open online courses (MOOCs). The main concern here was to design an appropriate strategy for Europe while guaranteeing the quality of learning systems and managing commitments to society.

EU elections ahead: finalising transport dossiers



The EU institutions are finalising a number of dossiers before the European Parliamentary elections in May and the nomination of a new Commission in the autumn. The fourth railway package is one of these: it

was adopted in Parliament plenary on 26 February. Our messages were taken on board, allowing greater flexibility for cities: the adopted definition of a 'competent local authority' is less constraining for local authorities than the original proposed by the Commission; and unduly prescriptive and mandatory detailed content in the transport plans has been avoided. The dossier must now be adopted in Council, possibly before the summer.

The Parliament's plenary session in April will be the last chance to conclude any remaining dossiers before the elections. Adoption of the Clean Power for Transport Package is

expected, followed by a Council agreement also in April; and the weights and dimensions directive should also be adopted in the April plenary.

The Parliament has decided to postpone any report on the Urban Mobility Package until after the elections. The Council is still deciding on its follow up. We will continue to monitor these dossiers to ensure the final outcomes are favourable for cities.

Social affairs forum in Barcelona

Our social affairs forum met in Barcelona on 5-7 March to discuss the role of cities in implementing the European Commission's Social Investment Package (SIP). Among the 120 delegates attending the forum, there were mayors, deputy mayors, councillors and city officers.

Participants reaffirmed their commitment to building inclusive cities and delivering efficient and effective social services at local level. Discussions covered a number of different areas, including specific workshops on migration, social innovation, local partnerships, and youth employment. The need for targeted investment in order to deal with the social impacts of the economic crisis, and the growing challenges posed by demographic change, were two underlying themes of the discussions.

Barcelona organised several study visits to demonstrate its own social inclusion policies at local level. These included the public-

private partnership involved in delivering the city's telecare service; a new concept for social housing for the homeless; and innovative strategies on youth employment, migration and emigration.

Youth unemployment is a pressing concern for most cities.

Delegates agreed that there needs to be strong coordination between education and employment policy at local level to ensure that young people can make a smooth transition into the labour market. The need for social innovation in order to find new approaches to long standing social issues was also an important priority.

The forum generated unprecedented levels of support from politicians and commitment from city representatives, with a number of proposals being made that will contribute to



the social affairs strategy for the coming year. Please see the front page for more details.

Mayors reflect on impact of free movement of EU citizens



Mayors and politicians from local authorities across Europe participated in an event on the impact of free movement of EU citizens at local level. It was organised by the European Commission on 11 February 2014 in Brussels.

We were represented on one of the panels by Anna König Jerlmyr, vice mayor of Stockholm for social affairs. She shared the experiences and challenges faced by her city with regards to the rapid increase of migration within the EU.

An independent study analysing the impact of the free movement of EU citizens in six European cities (Barcelona, Dublin, Hamburg, Lille, Prague and Turin), initiated by the European Commission, was presented at the conference.

Mayors from other European cities, including EUROCIITIES members The Hague, London and Lisbon, expressed the need to engage in a realistic discussion at European level.

Viviane Reding, vice president of the European Commission, cited EUROCIITIES as a notable example of transnational networks that should be encouraged at EU level.

Our partnership with the European Commission

We have for the third time been awarded a European Commission grant to strengthen the social inclusion dimension of urban policies for the period 2014-2017.

The grant, which is funded by the European Programme for Employment and Social Innovation (EaSI), is a follow up from the previous PROGRESS programme. It enables us to work in close partnership with the European Commission, via the directorate general for employment, social affairs and inclusion.

The grant will provide us with additional human and financial resources to support our activities related to social inclusion. For example, we are in the process of setting up a taskforce on the implementation of the European Social Investment Package (SIP) and will mainstream social inclusion into all our forums. We will also organise mutual learning events, such as peer reviews and study visits, and will prepare advocacy tools, such as publications of good practices, information videos and infographics. This grant will further enable us to ensure that the city perspective is reflected in EU social policy making and that cities are fully equipped to meet growing social challenges in Europe.

The city works together with local parks groups to determine what information is of most

interest to citizens, and is continually adding new features. In future, Edinburgh hopes to add routes for cyclists, pedestrians and runners, by importing data from partners.

Edinburgh Outdoors has been well received, with citizens actively contributing and talking proudly about their local parks.

It has had a positive impact on citizens’ health and wellbeing, and encourages people to get out and get involved in their local community.
